# Everyday and Everyway Talking about... October



October is a fun month filled with family events like Halloween. The Halloween break gives families more time to get together and have fun. Talking about what your family does to celebrate is a chance to teach language. Halloween is a time when children dress up and pretend. Acting like their favourite character encourages their imagination and their language skills.

Try these activities, songs, books, crafts to help your child learn. Speak, sing, and talk about books with your child in your own language.



#### Crafts and Activities

#### Make a leaf collage

Go for an Autumn walk and collect the treasures that have fallen onto the ground.

Talk about what you have gathered. There are all sorts of colours, shapes and sizes so talk about the differences and similarities.

Roll out a large piece of wallpaper and spread the leaves out, stick them down using a glue stick. Some of the leaves will change over a few days so it would be interesting to observe the changes.

#### Create a pumpkin Jack-o-lantern

Let your child help you. He can scoop out the seeds. Talk about how the seeds feel in your fingers.

Draw eyes, nose and a mouth on the outside of the pumpkin.

Wash the seeds, roast them and eat them as a snack or use them for some art/craft activity.

#### Make a Spider

Use pipe cleaners and one bump from an egg carton to make a spider.

Let you child draw a face on the egg carton.

Help him poke the pipe cleaners to make 8 legs.

Talk about spiders... Where do they live? How many legs do they have? What do they like to eat?

Sing "Incy Wincy Spider" song together!

#### Dress-Up

Dressing up is good for your child's imagination and language skills.

Start a dress-up collection, it does not always have to be bought outfits. Find out shirts, dresses, hats, shoes, jackets and play jewellery. Look for great dress-up clothes at a charity shop. Ask who they are, what they are dong or where they are going in their dress-up clothes.

If Halloween is not part of your family, culture or religious traditions, watch out for other events in your community. Often churches, community centres, neighbourhoods or even businesses will host "Harvest Festivals" where children can go, play games and have fun! You could start your own Fun traditions!

#### Autumn Leaves

One red squirrel climbs a tree (mime climbing)

#### **Five Little Goblins**

Five little goblins on a Halloween night
Made a very, very spooky sight
The first one danced on his tippy-tip-toes
The next one tumbled and bumped his nose

#### Out and about

When walking through the park extend your child's vocabulary to describe the leaves such as dry, crunchy, rustle and the way in which they fall such as twirl or float.

Point out Autumn colours in the trees or the appearance of warmer clothes in the ships. Look out for farmers taking in their harvest too.

If you have a kite enjoy flying it together. Talk about how the wind tugs at the kite as it flies.
