- Dinner money should be submitted on a Monday. Please ensure the correct amount is enclosed.

As the weather is turning colder we ask that parents send in a hat for your child to wear during outdoor play. Please ensure it is clearly labelled and leave it with a staff member.

Everyday and Everyway Talking about... November





In November, the days get shorter and the children may notice the moon for the first time. The weather starts to turn colder and you might see the first frost of the year. Our theme for this month is Bear and Teddy Bears so this is a wonderful opportunity to visit the zoo to see some real life ones and to enjoy the wealth of fairy tales and stories about bears. Remember that Pudsey Bear is a feature of November with BBC Children in Need so a good way to talk about helping others.

Try these activities, songs, books and crafts to help your children learn. Speak, sing and talk about books with your child in your own language.



Make up a guessing game to play with your child encouraging them to guess which animal you are thinking about. Simple clues are useful eg. "The animal I'm thinking of has a very long neck". "What might it be?"

Talk about the bears you might see in the zoo or a forest. We will be concentrating on polar bears, the black bear, the grizzly bear and the panda. What do the bears look like, where do they live and what might they eat?

Talk about animal patterns and help children to understand that some animals have spots and some have stripes. Perhaps this might lead to some discussion about camouflage.

Encourage your child to retell the story of Goldilocks and 3 Bears, in sequence and also talk about how Goldilocks and the Bears might feel at different parts of the nursery story eg. how did baby bear feel when he saw that someone had eaten all his porridge or how did Goldilocks feel when she woke to find 3 bears looking at her?



Moon

It gets dark a lot earlier now. The moon is easier to see. Talk about the colour of the moon, is it white, red, full or crescent? Talk about how the sun comes out when it's day.

Stars

Play a game to see who will be the first to see a star at night! Watch the sky with your child and look for falling stars. Cut out paper stars and let your child decorate them. Glue a stick on the back of the star to make a star puppet. Sing Twinkle Twinkle, little star. Decorate your child's room with glow in the dark stars.

More routines to talk about:

Daily routines

The activities you do everyday are great times to learn language. Try these ideas to make language learning part of the everyday things you do.

Getting dressed

Say the name of clothes – pyjamas, socks, underwear, pants, shirt, sweater, Pyjamas sweatshirt, tights, hats and so on. Talk about the weather and what he/she should wear. Talk about patterns (stripes, polka dots or pictures), parts (sleeves, pockets, zippers or buttons), how they fit (small, big, short, long or just right)

Mealtime

Talk about what you are doing as you get ready to eat. Talk about what you are eating. Talk about what you will do to clean up. Introduce lots of new vocabulary through talking about (and of course tasting) lots of new fruits and vegetables. Talk about what they look like, feel like, and where they come from.
